He appears in the ordinary dress of a citizen, black coat and pantaloous, and white vest-5 feet 10 or 11 inches high; and limps a little as he walks. All that he says and does is distinguished by singular taste and good sense, and he never seems for one moment to overstep the modesty of nature.' All is fit, all is happy

He was waited on, Monday evening, by Thomas Brockenbrough on the part of the committee of arrangements for this city, to ascertain his movements. The general informed him that he should embark at Jamestown for Norfolk, on the 21st; he should remain there inspecting the forts and navy yard, with the secretary of war, for two or three days, and would probably reach Richmond by the 25th.

On Monday the reception was purely civic-not a soldier appeared under arms. On Tuesday the troops were to turn out, and pass a review, and the general was to be addressed by general Taylor at the head of the military.

#### FROM GIBRALTAR.

We have been favored with a copy of the following interesting letter from Gibraltar, dated the 10th Sept

The game is up with the poor follows at Tariffa. After repulsing the French twice and holding the place three weeks, it surrendered alter an obstinate defence to the French, who took 126 prisoners and sent them all to O'Donnel at Aigestras, who has been shooting a greater por tion of them: we executed 30 at one time, amongst the number was the second in command, young Valdez, who behaved nobly to the last. The commander, by name also Valdez, escaped with a few of his followers across to Tangiers, where he fied to the protection of the American consul. Mr. Moliony, who has done his duty by protecting them, and relusing to give them up to the repeated demands of the French and Spanish consuls there. Another large party that went to Alme. Tis on a similar expedition to that at Tariffa was taken, and all shot immediately. The country is in a horrid state, and it is confidently asserted, that there are at present more than 80,000 persons confined in the Spanish prisons, for political sins and transgressions against the beloved Ferdinand.'
